What is an Ambulatory Surgery Center (ASC)

- ASC/Surgi-centers: medical facilities providing same-day surgical care, including diagnostic and preventive procedures
- Health care services come with a high price tag but ASCs are an exception
- Procedures performed in ASCs cost substantially less than in Hospitals
- Medicare program saves \$2.6 billion/year







The PDI Model


- 2002 three-county assessment: Need for a sustainable dentistry resource for low-income children who need dental treatment under general anesthesia (GA). Now serve 33 counties.
- Case management and prevention education programs were determined to be essential wrap-around services
- Volunteer board assembled & CEO hired
- \$1.3 million capital campaign (public/private funding)
- 2 operating room ASC certified by CMS, AAAHC, CA Dept of Health





PDI opened its doors January 2008

Mission: To maintain a sustainable dentistry resource that will serve the low income children of Northern California who need safe sedation for dental treatment, and to provide prevention education and promote oral health.



21,822 patients treated since 2008




Staffing

- CEO
- Administrator
- Medical Director and Dental Director
- Contracted pediatric dentists, anesthesiologists.
- Nurses, and dental assistants on staff
- 2 communications and fund development staff
- 4 educators/promoters, 2 caseworkers
- In-house biller and two front-desk staff

Special Needs

- Since 2008, PDI has been the permanent dental home for Autistic children up to age of 14 (first patients/day)
- They receive regular care and cleanings every 12 months
- In 2016, PDI expanded to treat patients with Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Down Syndrome and more (up to the age of 25)
- Treatment is provided on 2 days per month
- Treatment on adult teeth is more complex = 2 to 3 patients/day





Prevention Education

- The goal of PDI's prevention education programs is to reach children before children develop tooth decay that is to severe as to require treatment under general anesthesia (GA) and to keep Special Needs patients on a regular 12-18 month recall schedule for cleanings
- The Prevention Education Department consists of three programs:
 - In-house Oral Health Education
 - The Promotores (lay health worker) Program
 - Awareness Campaigns: Outreach and Public Information



Lessons Learned

- Communication: Open communication encourages staff, partners and supporters to innovate and suggest ways to further improve services. This is the culture of PDI
- **Education:** Raise awareness about the importance of dental health to overall health: children, teachers, parents, clinics, businesses, pediatricians/MDs, nurses, community workers about the importance of dental health to overall health
- Partnerships: PDI partners with 100+ Northern California agencies.
- Measurement: To improve programs PDI measures results
